SECOND QUARTER SUCCESS CLUB MEETING

The second quarter Success Club Meeting was held June 25th. Two consumers along with the Community Employment Specialists (CES) enjoyed a delicious lunch at The Moratoc Restaurant in Williamston after a refreshing stroll at the Roanoke River Boardwalk. A few key topics were discussed such as: how to handle the transition of new management and compromising with your employer when asking for time off during non-emergency situations.

Vocational Rehabilitation Work Adjustment (WA) has been successful in reaching our goal for the 12-13 fiscal year. The original goal of 41 for job placements for Work Adjustment was increased to 55. Overall the job coaches were successful in meeting the goal and ending the fiscal year with the exact number of 55 Major Benefits. We also placed 9 Supported Employment (SE) clients for a total of 64 placements. The clients placed were determined and dedicated to the services provided through Martin Enterprises and the job coaches. Clients gained employment through various businesses including: Wilco Hess, Service Works Express, Home Life Care, QSI, Agape Community Health Center of Washington, Wal-Mart, Subway, Mega Force, Holden, Packaging Crafts of Bethel, and Hardee's just to name a few.

Each month a Work Adjustment in-house consumer is recognized as the Outstanding Worker of the Month. Each received a certificate, 50 tokens and a free lunch coupon for their accomplishments.

CES Carter, CES Jefferson, and CES Williams strive daily to help each consumer seek employment, enhance the skills needed to obtain and maintain a job, prepare them for interviews, and arrange transportation.

The overall goal for the consumers is to achieve each individualized goal including maintaining and gaining work experience for 90 days or more.

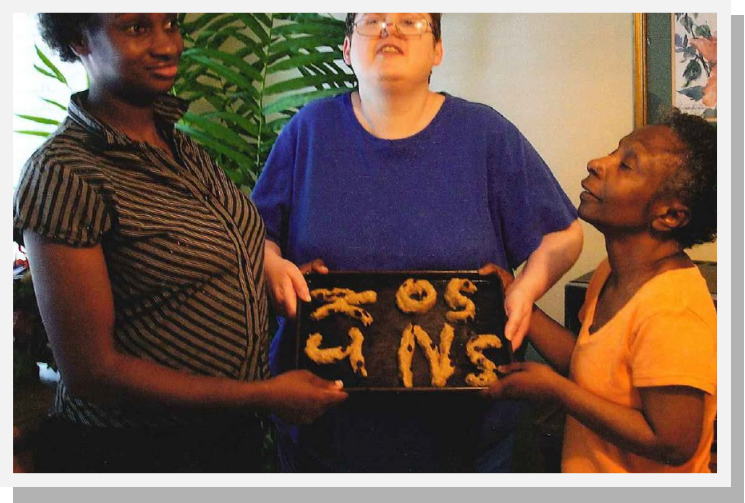
