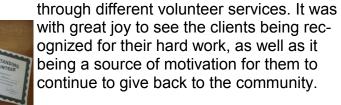

#### Vocational Rehabilitation Services

Work Adjustment and Supported Employment's Success

The Vocational Rehabilitation Department focuses on providing quality service and assisting consumers overcome criminal, mental, personal, transportation, and educational barriers throughout the duration of receiving services. Our Work Adjustment new placement goal for the current fiscal year is 60. A total of 7 consumers have obtained employment for the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2015. Consumers receive one-on one services from qualified Community Employment Specialists Carter, Jefferson, and Williams, in the areas that enrich each individual's interpersonal skills and helps prepare them for job placement. Job placement sites range from Service Xpress, Pronamics, Waffle House, Perdue, WalCoates Elementary, Red Heron Café, HTM Concepts, Mega Force, and the Waffle House. Current placements have brought about a positive start and with additional support and openness from employers; our consumers will be granted more employment opportunities to prove that they too are capable of being productive persons in the community. The overall goal for the consumers is to achieve each individualized goal written including gaining and maintaining work experience for 90 days or more.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Department also assists consumers through assessment evaluations that help the individual gain employment skills while utilizing the in-house program. The consumer earns monthly pay and is expected to follow the rules and regulations of the facility. The consumers gain employment skills and etiquette for job readiness. In addition, each month, an in-house consumer is high-lighted as the Outstanding Worker of the Month. Each consumer received a certificate, 50 tokens and a free lunch card for their accomplishments.

The first quarter Success Club Meeting was held on March 25, 2015. Two consumers along with CES Jefferson and Williams were in attendance. Participants had lunch at Golden Corral in Washington and visited the Washington Waterfront. Topics for the Success Club Outing covered working during non-scheduled hours, safety at work, and transitioning under new management. One of the participants informed the CES that she was asked to work in a different area at her job. She obtained experience in quality/quantity control. The new task demanded she work in close proximity with her co-workers as a team and increase production while maintaining quality. She successfully counted, dispersed, and signed off on orders totaling over a 100 pieces per day. She and her employer were very proud of her accomplishment.
